There was a buzz of excitement and anticipation in the air as the more than 150 attendees signed in at the reception table.

Williams, President, Quinebaug Valley Community College, Anita Gliniecki, President of Housatonic Community College, and Dr. John C. Norman, Dean of Continuing Education at Northwestern Connecticut Community College and the Recipient of the Friend of CONNTAC Award in 2007.

The highlight of every CONNTAC Breakfast meeting, excluding the stirring musical renditions of Anthony Harrington, is the awarding of scholarships to honor and encourage outstanding students who have overcome tremendous obstacles in order to pursue higher education, and this year was no exception. Ten students, Eduardo Luis Baez, Meriden, Lavanda Bryant, New Haven, Melissa Cartagena, Hartford, Arthur Caudill, Danielson, Chavonne Cook, New Britain, Stacy Desrouilleres, Bridgeport, Marcelino Lopez, Jr., Bridgeport, Minassemma Loukaka, Norwalk, Chanel Matos, Stamford, and

Evelyne Mukasonga, Bridgeport, each received \$1,000.00 awards and their stories of overcoming life's impediments and challenges were as compelling as always.

However, the Keynote Speaker Dr. Elsa Nunez, President, Eastern Connecticut State University took the audience to the emotional summit with her presentation. She described in vivid and heart wrenching detail her own experiences as the first in her family to pursue a postsecondary education and the enormous financial and emotional sacrifices both she and her large immigrant family made for her to fulfill her father's dream that she has "Got to go

to college." She talked about the day she attended her college orientation, which left her feeling so "out of place" that she vowed never return to the campus because she felt, "I don't fit." She observed that she did not dress like the other female students and her student guide completely ignored her after their initial meeting. On returning home, she quickly changed her mind about attending college and "Grew up in 15 seconds," when she learned that instead of buying groceries for the family, her mother had used the money to buy her freshly minted, college freshman daughter, the 'inappropriate' shoes and dress she had worn to orientation. In recognizing

the enormous sacrifice that was made for her, Dr. Nunez "went to college and never stopped or looked back." She now believes that class distinctions present a greater barrier to achievement in higher education that race does, "The issue of class in America is complex, it shapes lives and affects educational opportunity," and she asked the audience to participate in a conversation about the difficulties that socio-economic disparities present to low-income students in higher education. "Students from modest backgrounds face great challenges," she said.

The Friend of CONNTAC Award was awarded this year to Doris B. Arrington, Dean of Students, Capital Community College.

Dean Arrington said that she accepted the Award with "Humility and gratitude" and noted that a friend is one who is held in high esteem and was very pleased to be so honored by the Board of Directors of CONNTAC, Inc. Dean Arrington also reflected on the importance her college education has played in her life, "It was the single most significant aspect of my career."

In bringing the morning's activities to a close, Kenneth G. Armstrong, President of CONNTAC, Inc. encouraged the members of the audience to continue its support of this very worthwhile organization, as it continues to help our students overcome the barriers they encounter in their quest to attain a college education.

Maximizing Your Scholarship Search

It's no secret that the cost of a college education is enormously expensive. With this in mind, it is important to apply for plenty of scholarships. Scholarships, like grants, are a form of financial aid that does not have to be repaid. However, one does not qualify for a scholarship by filling out the FAFSA. Students must apply for scholarships individually, and they may apply

for as many as necessary. Contrary to popular belief, scholarship eligibility isn't limited to students with high academic averages or those who can demonstrate financial need. Students of all background and levels of ability, new or returning, undergraduate or graduate, can find sources for scholarships.

The only tools needed for your scholarship search are a pen, 10 copies of sample "Request for Scholarship Application Letters," stamped envelopes, and dedication. Try to begin your scholarship search early. The earlier the better! Also, give priority to state, regional, and local scholarships. Most students will have more success with scholarships targeted to a smaller group. Many regional foundations offer a common application so students can apply for several scholarships using one application. Check the guidance office or career center to review listings. In addition, ask parents and

relatives about scholarship opportunities through their employer, church, and/or civic organizations. It is also a good idea to check the college web-sites for potential grants and scholarships when researching schools of choice. Retrieve the scholarship applications from the college's admissions or financial aid office. In addition remember to inquire at libraries, religious affiliations, community organizations, local agencies, and businesses for more scholarship leads. Last but not least, look toward reputable internet financial aid resources for scholarships. Useful sites include:

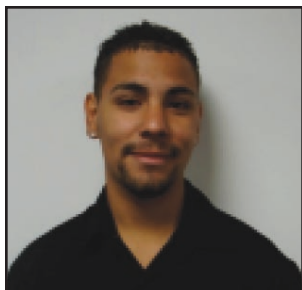

Field of Interest: Criminal Justice • CONNTAC Representative: Mashal Ebadi**

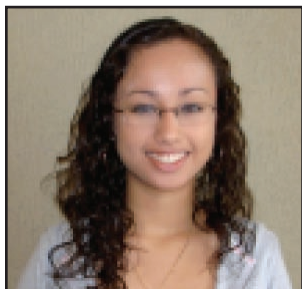

Field of Interest: Engineering and Human Services • CONNTAC Representative: Teresa Gonzales**

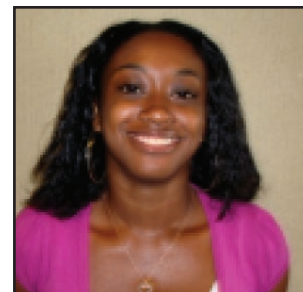

Field of Interest: Diagnostic Medical Sonographer • **CONNTAC Representative:** Erica Coleman

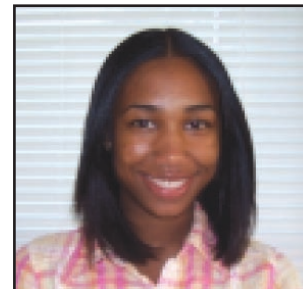

Field of Interest: Occupational Therapist • **CONNTAC Representative:** Lisa Slade

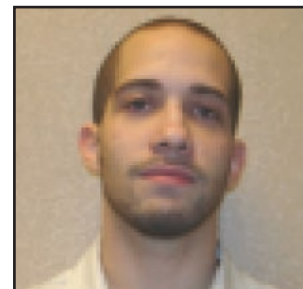

CONNTAC-EOC Lands Client in Prison

Connecticut Talent Assistance Cooperative-Educational Opportunity Center (CONNTAC-EOC) has been a part of my life since April 1988. I returned

to this country with my two small children, ages 3 1/2 and 5. We arrived with only the clothes on our backs and three suitcases. I had no job prospects or a place to live. I did, however, have a high school diploma and plenty experience as a waitress. At the time, it was far better to be in the United States with family and friends who cared about us than to stay in a very volatile situation. I asked myself, "How am I going to support these children and give them a better life than what I had?" I made a few phone calls and was put in touch with an educational counselor from CONNTAC-EOC who worked out of Mattatuck Community College; now known as Naugatuck Valley Community College.

The counselor was able to help me with all the paperwork of registering for the class, filling out the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form, and giving me Pell Grant information. In May 1988, I took my first college course in many years. It was a four-credit Biology class. I did not think I would be able to get a good grade having been told all my life that I was "stupid" (first by my father and then by my husband). Today, I realize the detrimental effect these two people

had on my life. Not only did I earn an "A" in the class, but I went on to become a peer tutor through the college's Work Study Program. While at Mattatuck, I received a couple of scholarships due to my hard work and high grade point average. In May 1989 I graduated summa cum laude with an Associate's Degree in Liberal Arts. I was the first person in my family to earn a college degree. What an exhilarating feeling!

My CONNTAC counselor helped me make the transition from Mattatuck to Central Connecticut State University. Naturally, there was more paperwork. He helped me with registering for courses, filling out the FAFSA form and provided me with more Pell Grant and scholarship information. I took five courses each semester and two to three courses in the summertime. I would also take a course during the winter inter-sessions. In December 1991 I completed my Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education and graduated magna cum laude. Wow! Another achievement in my life that I never believed would happen to me. I realized during these years that I was also doing something that would help my children—I was a positive role model for them. They saw me studying. They saw me budgeting my time so that we could spend quality time together (even though there was not a lot of it). They saw me going to all their school and extra-curricular functions. They were witnesses to what is called delayed gratification. I had to put them and my education ahead of me. I had

to put time for myself on hold. I knew in my heart that it would pay off. And, it did.

In February 1992, I received a phone call from my Mattatuck CC counselor who asked if I had gotten a teaching position. I had not. I reminded him that it was February and not too many schools were looking for teachers then. He told me he heard of a part-time teaching position with the State of Connecticut. I asked, "A teaching position with the State? I cannot work part-time, I need a full-time position." He said, "Okay, but it has full benefits." In my head I could hear the sound of just a winning jackpot at a slot machine. Oh, my goodness. I needed to have the benefits for my children. I asked, "Where?" He said, "A prison." I asked, "Are you kidding me? You have got to be kidding!" I did not know they had school in prison. I never heard of it. I interviewed for the position and got it. This was one of the best things that ever happened to me.

I went on to get my Master's Degree and Sixth-Year Certificate and am now a Principal at a men's prison in Enfield, CT. And wouldn't you know, I am still utilizing CONNTAC-EOC services. Every other week, Educational Counselor Claire Gagner comes to the prison to help the inmates with their transition back to society by getting them the assistance they need to further their education. I am ever so grateful to CONNTAC-EOC for helping others and me to fulfill dreams that may not have been possible.
